












DIRECTOR'S NOTES

After the success of Comic Potential in May, we are proud to be bringing you this production of Gogol's The Government Inspector. It was Kerry Elliott who suggested we stage Comic Potential and she also suggested The Government Inspector. went online and found reviews for a very successful production by Theatre iNQ in Townsville. Terri Brabon, artistic director of the company had written a new adaptation of the Gogol modern classic. I contacted Terri and asked if there was a copy of the script and would it be possible for us to stage it. Terri was very helpful and was working on a final copy. She emailed it to me when it was done. It was a great read and much of the play had been modernised to be set in Australia without being overly 'ockerish'.

I have chosen this play not merely because it is a very funny comedy and has some terrific characters in it, but also, in keeping with our goal of staging plays that are entertaining and that explore themes relevant to a modern society.

The Government Inspector depicts the nature of corruption and how it escalates if it is allowed to. I can recall that Barry O'Farrell, a former NSW premier, resigned because he had accepted a \$3,000 bottle of Penfolds

Grange and not declared it; the state Independent Commission Against Corruption found him to be guilty of a breach of duty.

Senior minister in Hawke's Labor Government, Mick Young, resigned because he brought into the country a stuffed Paddington bear without declaring it. The 2022 federal election was partly fought on the need for there to be a National Anti-Corruption Commission that would have considerable powers to stamp out corruption in the federal parliament. It has been established, but has it had an impact?

In America, Donald Trump is openly rejecting the rule of law and brazenly accepting gifts. Is this the way we are headed? I hope not. There are regular reports of politicians abusing their privilege and using government transport for private use. Land bought for an airport with the government paying 10 times more than it was worth and dodgy water buy back schemes to the tune of \$80 million. There seems to be less concern by people in positions of power that they are behaving in a corrupt manner. The Fitzgerald Inquiry into corruption in the Queensland government and police in 1989 saw the resignation of Joh

Bjelke-Pietersen, the jailing of three former ministers and the resignation of the Police Commissioner. Have we now become tolerant of corruption? Do we expect it? Do we feel there is nothing to be done about it?

In tonight's play we welcome Damien White back in the role of Barry Barrymore, the "Gov", a former property developer who now runs the town with one shonky deal after another. Rebecca Gardner is Anna, his wife, and Amber Faull is the not so bright daughter, Marya. We have new blood coming into the company: Fabiola Calderon is Chilean and plays Josie, the small town 'lady of the night'; Damien Croft is Warren Dobbs, the bent finance officer, and Kenya Styles is servant, Mischka. Good to see returning players Marcus Catt as conman Alex Bragg; Ellie-May Lawson as Warren's

corrupt wife, Lauren; and Meredith Krieg, Stephanie Russell, and Geoff Hastwell as dodgy dealers from the local council. We welcome also our three Stagehands: Sara Azadegan, Dhruva Nagaraj and Annie Gladdis, who was our *Comic Potential* stage manager, is this time bringing her energy on the stage.

I'm sure you will have a great night out and at Blackwood Players we will continue to bring you a diverse range of plays and experiences that will be entertaining, stimulating and thought-provoking.

I am grateful to Terri Brabon for allowing us to stage her play and I appreciate David Jobling's (Radio PBA FM) warm support for the direction we are heading in, in including modern Australian plays in our repertoire.

PROLOGUE



Born in 1809, Nikolai Gogol wasn't very popular amongst his school chums. He was regularly bullied and referred to as "a mysterious dwarf". Wikipedia describes him as possessing "a dark and secretive disposition, marked by painful self-consciousness and boundless ambition." Not quite sure how Wikipedia knows that insightful slice of information but as it's on the internet, we all know it must be true.

Nevertheless, little Nikolai would grow to become one of the biggest influences on Russian and world literature. His novels and short stories would be adapted into films, and operas and he would even have his face depicted on a postage stamp. So. . . . suck on that, school chums.

The story goes like this – in 1836, at the age of 27, Gogol decided to try his hand at writing a comedy for the stage. He turned to his friend, the famed writer Alexander Pushkin – and said "Alex, I'm going to write a comedy. You give me a plot and I'll knock it out in two months, and it'll be the funniest thing you have ever heard." And that is precisely what came to pass.

And now, here in the Village of Towns, in an act of unmitigated arrogance, our writer set herself a similar task; she would take that original work of literary genius and adapt it into a re-imagined context in the same time period of two months.
